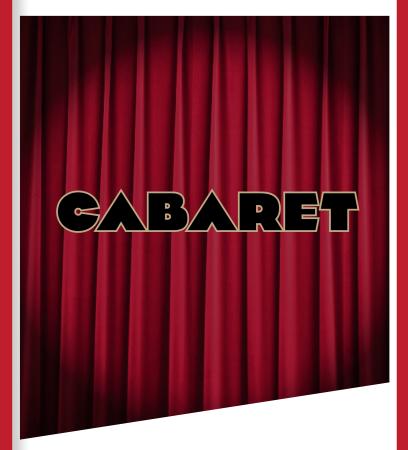

The taking of photographs and the use of recording devices are not allowed during a performance and are a violation of state and federal copyright laws.

Cancellations

If a show is cancelled due to bad weather, an email will be sent to ticket holders. Cancellations will be noted on the phone system, website, and social media sites. Tickets for a cancelled performance may be exchanged for another performance. Please be sure the ticket office has your email information and current phone in the event a performance is cancelled. The Playhouse does not sell its contacts and does not sell or trade its email addresses.

Concessions

A variety of beverages and candy may be available for purchase and are allowed in auditoriums. No outside drink or food are allowed. Staff reserve the right to denv alcoholic beverage service to anyone at their discretion.

Elevator

An elevator between levels is located at the east end of the building.

Emergency Exits

Please note the exit nearest your seat location. In the event of an emergency, guest services staff will provide direction.

Etiquette

Latecomers will be seated at an appropriate break in the play. Lobby chimes are sounded five minutes before curtain as well as the close of intermission. Disruptive, unruly guests, regardless of age, will be asked to leave. Cell phone ringers should be turned off.

Lost Items

Lost items will be held in the ticket office.

Free parking is available in The Playhouse lots and on streets surrounding the theatre. After 5:00 PM daily, free parking is available in the Shops at Roosevelt's east/back parking lot. Parking in the west/front Shops parking lot is always restricted to Shops customers. The Playhouse is not responsible for loss of any personal property left in vehicles.

Performance Content

The Playhouse does not rate subject matter as sensitivities vary from person to person. Questions about content, age appropriateness, or other aspects of the show such as strobe lights and other theatrical affects should be directed to the ticket office.

Performance Schedule

The regular John Viars Theatre performance schedule is 7:30 PM Wednesdays through Saturdays and 2:00 PM Sundays. The regular Kate Goldman Children's Theatre performance schedule is 7:00 PM Fridays, and 1:00 PM and 4:00 PM Saturdays and Sundays. The Family Holiday Classic performance schedule is 7:00 PM Wednesdays through Fridays, and 1:00 PM and 5:00 PM Saturdays and Sundays. All times are subject to change.

Preshow Talk

A preshow talk for each John Viars Theatre performance will begin 30 minutes prior to curtain in the west lobby.

Each audience member must occupy a seat and have a ticket, including infants.

Ticket Office Hours

The ticket office is open Noon to 5:00 PM, Tuesdays through Fridays, and 90 minutes prior to performances. Tickets are available 24 hours a day, seven days a week, online. Ticketing fees are the same whether purchased online, by phone, or at the ticket office.

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Cabaret

Katy Merriman, Playhouse Artistic Director

We enjoy programming classic, well-loved musicals on the John Viars Theater mainstage—high energy performances, timeless showtunes you love to sing along with, and memorable stories with heart. And after a year of pandemic theatre, we are *ready* for a big of musical.

The stories you see on our stage can serve many purposes: to teach, to entertain, to explain or illuminate. As we head into a post-COVID, post-2020 world, it is the service and duty of our art form to tell stories that help us become better people and respond to the world around us. This is clear in some of the wonderfully reconceived revivals of late: Daniel Fish's 2019 revival of *Oklahoma!* stood traditional casting on its head and found a new depth of meaning to the story.

I think The Playhouse is perfectly suited to present classic musicals you know and love AND to find ways to keep the meaning relevant to current audiences.

Director David A. VanCleave is a young and innovative artist who has infused this season opening production of *Cabaret* with energy and relevance. (Fun fact: He also made his Playhouse debut at age 12 as a Goblin in *The Hobbit*.) You will recognize and adore these characters and songs, and you also may see them in a new or different light that makes you consider something you've never thought about before.

Please enjoy a few thoughts from David about *Cabaret* and what makes this classic story so relevant and compelling today:

Much like Cliff Bradshaw, author Christopher Isherwood travelled to Berlin 1929 for two reasons: creative inspiration and sexual exploration. In the aftermath of World War I, the newly created Weimar Republic ended censorship, enacted liberal social policies, and had an incredibly attractive currency exchange. This combination attracted scientists, artists, scholars, feminists, and queer people (like Isherwood) from around the world. By the end of the 1920s, Berlin was the cultural capital of the western world – an endless party of exuberant creativity and experimentation.

But the party wasn't endless. It ended in the death of more than 11 million

"How did Hitler happen?" is one of history's most central questions, and a question we cannot stop asking. How did a country – a world – allow the darkest chapter of our history? How did a society sit blindly while their friends and neighbors were persecuted, tortured, and killed? These are questions that did not end with the second world war and that we continue to grapple with today. Cabaret puts a thin layer of shine on the persecution of anyone who is an "other" and asks its audience, "What would you do?" (David A. VanCleave)

Hal Prince, director of the original 1966 production, said of *Cabaret*: "To us, at least, [*Cabaret*] was a play about civil rights, the problem of [Black people] in America, about how it can happen here.... the parallel between the spiritual bankruptcy of Germany in the 1920s and our country in the 1960s."

So welcome to Cabaret! It is Germany in 1930. It is America in 2021. It is then and now; the Kit Kat Klub and our own community. Here, life can be beautiful.



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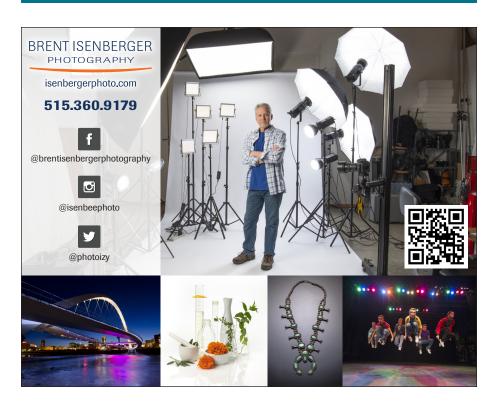

His professional credits include resident scenic designer at the Alley Theatre in Houston, where he designed more than 25 productions including the design and remount of *A Christmas Carol* for 10 seasons. Jay was head of the theatre design and production programs at the University of Arkansas, Little Rock, and UC Santa Barbara, where he served for 13 years before returning to lowa. He has designed more than 100 productions for many of the Greater Des Moines theatre companies. He is a four-time Cloris Award winner and, in 2020, received the Cloris Lifetime Achievement Award.



Angela Lampe (Costume Designer/Associate Artistic Director) began her tenure with The Playhouse in 1993 and has designed costumes, sets, and props for nearly 300 productions

Korey Williams (Assistant Stage Manager) has a background in stage management. Locally, she has stage managed productions for Des Moines Young Artists' Theatre (Hairspray Jr) and

Joe Masteroff (Book) had only one dream from infancy: to write for the theatre. After the essential lonely childhood and four-year stint in the Air Force, he came to New York to face his future: book writer or book seller? Luckily, luck intervened. Before long he had three shows on Broadway bearing his name: The Warm Peninsula starring Julie Harris, and two musicals, She Loves Me and Cabaret, for which he was the book writer. His other work included the libretto for 70, Girls, 70 and Desire Under the Elms and book and lyrics for Six Wives and Paramour. Thanks to indulgent parents, the New Dramatists, Hal Prince, and many others, Masteroff retired and lived in subdued luxury until his death in 2018.



John Kander (Composer) is a Tony, Emmy, and Grammy-winning composer, a recipient of the Kennedy Center Honors Award, and a member of the American Theatre Hall of Fame. With

frequent collaborator Fred Ebb, he composed the score to dozens of Broadway musicals, including Cabaret, Zorba, Chicago, The Act, Woman of the Year, The Rink, Kiss of the Spider Woman, and Steel Pier. Kander attended Oberlin College and earned a Master of Arts degree from Columbia University. He believes his big break in New York came by accident: He went to a club in Philadelphia after seeing a performance of West Side Story. By chance he happened to meet the pianist, who asked Kander to substitute for him while he went on vacation. The stage manager for West Side Story then asked Kander to play the auditions for her next show, Gypsy. During the Gypsy auditions, Kander met the choreographer, Jerry Robbins, who then suggested that Kander actually write the dance music for the show. As a composer, Kander made his Broadway debut in 1962 with A Family Affair. A year later Kander met lyricist Ebb. Their first song, "My Coloring Book," was nominated for a Grammy award. Kander and Ebb's first theatrical collaboration, The Golden Gate, never opened on Broadway. Cabaret, Kander and Ebb's triumphant hit, opened on Nov. 20, 1966, at the Broadhurst Theatre and ran for 1,166 performances. The show won the 1966 Tony Award for Best Musical and Kander and Ebb won for Best Score. In 1972. the film adaptation starring Liza Minnelli won several Oscars. The stage musical was revived at the Imperial Theatre in 1987 with some of the original cast reprising their roles. The show was revived again in 1998, earning another Tony for Best Revival. In 2000 Kander and Ebb were working together on *The Visit*. After Ebb passed away in 2004, Kander completed the project with playwright Terrence McNally. Kander's film work includes scores for Kramer vs. Kramer (1979), Places in the Heart (1984), and Billy Bathgate (1991), and songs for New York, New York (1977), Cabaret (1972), and Funny Lady (1975). Kander and Ebb also collaborated on music for several television specials. In 1974 they won an Emmy Award and Grammy Award for their work on Liza with a 'Z.' In addition to his Tony. Grammy, and Emmy awards. Kander received the Oscar Hammerstein Award for Lifetime Achievement in Musical Theatre.



Fred Ebb (Lyricist) was an award-winning lyricist, librettist, and director who frequently and successfully collaborated with composer John Kander. Ebb's work for the theatre included

Flora. The Red Menace: Cabaret: The Happy Time: Zorba; 70, Girls, 70; Chicago; The Act; Woman of the Year; 2x5; The Rink; And The World Goes Round - The Kander and Ebb Musical: Kiss of the Spider Woman; and Steel Pier. His film work included Cabaret: Lucky Lady: New York, New York; Funny Lady; Kramer vs. Kramer; Places in the Heart; Stepping Out; and the 2003 Academy Award winner for best picture, Chicago. For television, Ebb wrote Liza with a Z, Goldie and Liza Together (starring Goldie Hawn and Liza Minnelli). Ol' Blue Eyes is Back (starring Frank Sinatra), Baryshnikov on Broadway, An Early Frost, and Liza in London. His last projects included Curtains, with book by Rupert Holmes. Ebb also provided additional material for the updated script of Rodgers & Hart's By Jupiter and additional lyrics for the 1997 TV remake of Rodgers & Hammerstein's Cinderella. Ebb earned four Tony Awards (Cabaret. Woman of the Year, Kiss of the Spider Woman) and four Primetime Emmy awards (Liza with a Z, Gypsy in My Soul, Liza Minnelli Live From Radio City Music Hall) along with dozens of other accolades, including the Kennedy Center Honors and membership in the American Theatre Hall

of Fame. In 2005, by instruction of Ebb's will, the Fred Ebb Foundation was established to present an annual award to an up-and-coming musical theatre writer or writing team.



Katy Merriman (Artistic Director) has been an active member of the local theatre community since moving to Des Moines in 2013. Her Playhouse directing credits include the recent co-

production with Pyramid Theatre Company, A Love Offering (co-director with Tiffany Johnson), Some Enchanted Evening, Stuart Little, I and You, The Roommate, Love Letters, and Elephant & Piggie's "We Are in a Play!" Prior to becoming artistic director, Katy appeared on The Playhouse stage in shows including Into the Woods (Cinderella), Les Misérables (Cosette), Completeness (Molly), and Legally Blonde the Musical (Elle Woods) and was the musical director for The Playhouse Performance Academy from 2016 to 2018. Katy worked with Iowa Stage Theatre Company as a resident artist where her performance credits include The Glass Menagerie (Laura) and Our Town (Emily). She also directed their 2018 production of Fun Home. Prior to her time in Des Moines, Katy worked with numerous theatres as a performer, director, and administrator. She has a Bachelor of Music from Butler University in Indianapolis, IN.
