




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Iowa In the Dark

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LEAVING IOWA AND STUART LITTLE

The word "pivot" doesn't feel quite strong enough to describe the wave of changes in plans and operations at The Playhouse since last March. We are used to working at least a year in advance on productions, hearing live orchestras, and casting up to 30 performers to work with crews of 10 to 20. The silver lining, from my perspective at least, is that we have also been challenged to tell stories with less... everything. We have to change hearts with words alone without relying on something big and shiny in the background to keep things interesting. It makes us remember that we only need a performer and someone to watch to have a moving theatrical experience.

We began performing plays "in rep" last fall, alternating performances each week, and continue this schedule into the 2021 portion of our current season. While the fall shows shared a unit set with fixed walls that housed realistic cabin and bedroom looks, our winter plays take place on a more open stage and make room for your imagination to build the worlds you will visit.

Stuart Little, written by E. B. White and adapted for the stage by Patrick Flynn, draws viewers into the adventures of a

small and remarkable mouse with only five actors and the boxes and crates they've brought with them to the day's performance. Similarly, *Leaving Iowa*, by Tim Clue and Spike Manton, uses four actors, a few boxes, and a beautiful Iowa landscape to transport the audience to a family's story of road trips and what we really mean to our loved ones.

Don't mistake the simplicity of set and visual elements of either production for a lack of excitement – you will be swept into each story the moment one performer starts communicating with one viewer, you.

Katy Merriman (*Director*/Stuart Little, *Artistic Director*) has been an active member of the local theatre community since moving to Des Moines in 2013. Her Playhouse stage credits

include Meredith Willson's The Music Man (Marian Paroo), Into the Woods (Cinderella), Les Misérables (Cosette), and Legally Blonde the Musical (Elle Woods). She was the musical director for The Playhouse Performance Academy production of Meredith Willson's The Music Man Jr. and directed Elephant & Piggie's "We Are in a Play!" Katy has also worked with Iowa Stage Theatre Company as a resident artist where her performance credits include The Glass Menagerie (Laura) and Our Town (Emily). She also directed their 2018 production of Fun Home. Prior to her time in Des Moines, Katy worked with numerous theatres as a performer, director, and administrator. She has a Bachelor of Music from Butler University in Indianapolis, IN. Katy and her husband, Max Wellman, have a son, Jack.



Jenny Bryant (Stage Manager/ Stuart Little) has been involved at The Playhouse – running followspot, shifting scenery, designing properties, and other run crews – for more

than 30 shows. As a high school student, she

was a recipient of a 2015 Volunteer of the Year Dionysos Award for her work both backstage and in the education department as a PIP (preintern program). Jenny was a Playhouse summer theatre education intern in 2017. A recent graduate of the University of Northern Iowa with a degree in elementary education, Jenny is a substitute teacher.



Malibu Brown (Assistant Stage Manager/Stuart Little) is a graduate of Collins-Maxwell Middle/High School. At Collins-Maxwell, she took to the stage as Ellie Blake in Freaky Friday

and the title character in *Annie* and also served as stage manager for *Matilda The Musical*. Additional stage experience includes Mac in *Teen Beach Movie* at Nevada's Center Stage theatre and Hattie in *Ella Enchanted* at The Playhouse. Malibu plays the ukulele and likes dancing and hanging out with her friends.



Alex Snodgrass (Scenic Charge Artist) has worked as a freelance designer and instructor locally and up and down the East Coast. He is a graduate of the Conservatory of Theatre Arts at

Webster University (Missouri). Alex is the technical director/designer at Grand View University. He has worked with The Playhouse as stage manager and designer, most recently as scenic designer for the summer's Live Theatre Drive-In productions; Repertory Theater of St. Louis (lighting designer, prop artisan); Opera Theatre of St. Louis (prop artisan); Des Moines Social Club (scenic and lighting designer); Des Moines Young Artists' Theatre (scenic and lighting designer); Northern Stage (props management) and Saint Michael's Playhouse (scenic design), both in Vermont; and more. He has served as a technical theatre teacher and coach at Des Moines Roosevelt High School and Waukee High School. Alex is the recipient of the 2016 Cloris Award for Best Lighting Design for his work on DMYAT's The Hobbit. His favorite Playhouse memory is throwing large things out the trap door in Seussical The Musical on the mainstage.



Angela Lampe (Costume Designer/Properties Designer) began her tenure with The Playhouse in 1993 and has designed costumes, sets, and props for nearly 300 productions

including Guys and Dolls, Meredith Willson's The Music Man, A Gentleman's Guide to Love and Murder, Ella Enchanted, The Miraculous Journey of Edward Tulane, Ragtime, Les Misérables, Disney's The Little Mermaid, West Side Story, Into the Woods, A Streetcar Named Desire, Sunset Boulevard, and Hairspray. She has a B.A. from Central College in Pella and a M.F.A. in theatre from the University of Nebraska. She is the recipient of four Cloris Awards for excellence in costuming and puppetry.



Virgil Kleinhesselink (Lighting Designer) owns VTEC Productions sound company and is technical director at Des Moines Hoover High School where he designed lights for their

production of *Les Misérables Jr.* Virgil began his Playhouse career in 1979 and since then has been involved with more than 200 shows as designer or actor.

Tim Clue (playwright/Leaving Iowa) wrote stand up comedy for his first writing gig. In 1991 he established Short Story Theatre, a multimedia theatrical company that combined short fiction adaptations with documentary footage. Greek Streets was their inaugural work, using short stories by Harry Mark Petrakis. Other Definitions of Confinement premiered at the National Jewish Theater in 1993, introducing the life and writings of Russian political prisoner Dmitry Stonov, and in 1997 Coloring Potential debuted and focused on the stories of Chicago's inner-city youth. In 1999, Spike Manton and Clue wrote and directed a Chicago-based television sitcom pilot entitled *Tiny* Pig that "made it into the can," but not onto TV; it is now being adapted into a comedy musical. Their play Leaving lowa is being written as a screenplay. Clue and Manton's next full-length work, currently being workshopped, is another Midwesternthemed play called Standing in Mattoon, a comedy about two desperate souls who enter a unique contest of endurance in hopes that they can win a van and change their lives. Clue grew up in Rochelle, IL, and still lives in Chicago with his wife. Kathryn, and their daughter, Bailey.

Spike Manton (playwright/Leaving Iowa) was born on a farm in far upstate New York, but his parents soon moved the family to a bustling metropolis of almost 2,000 people, where he grew up in a standard 1960s family unit of four kids. two parents, and one station wagon. As child number three, Manton is very familiar with the seating location known as "the way back." After graduating from Bradley University, he moved to Chicago, guit his Procter & Gamble sales job, got married, and began a career in standup comedy. Standup led to cable TV shows like An Evening at the Improv and appearances on MTV and Comedy Central. More importantly, it led to a career in Chicago radio, where Manton spent 10 years hosting FM talk shows and sports talk shows on ESPN Radio. Along the way, he has been creating and producing original works with his writing partner, Tim Clue. Leaving lowa is their best example of executing that plan to date. although they have many projects at various stages of production. Manton lives in Chicago with his wife, Tami, and their two children, Mickey and Samantha.

Joseph Robinette (*playwright*/Stuart Little) is a Tony Award nominee and Drama Desk Award nominee for the libretto of the acclaimed A Christmas Story, The Musical. He is the author or co-author of 55 published plays and musicals. His works have been produced at the Lunt-Fontanne Theatre. The Theater at Madison Square Garden, and Lincoln Center for the Performing Arts in New York City; the 5th Avenue Theatre in Seattle: the Goodman Theatre in Chicago: the BBC in Britain: in all 50 states: and in 21 foreign countries. Twelve of his works have been translated into foreign languages, and another five have been anthologized. Robinette collaborated with E.B. White on the authorized stage version of Charlotte's Web, and he wrote the musical version with Charles Strouse (Annie and Bye, *Bye, Birdie*). Other dramatizations include *The* Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe; Anne of Green Gables: and Debbie Macomber's A Gift to Last and The Inn at Rose Harbor. He is the recipient of the American Alliance for Theatre and Education's Distinguished Play Award for Sarah, Plain and Tall and the Children's Theatre Foundation of America medallion for his "body of dramatic works for family audiences in the United States and beyond."

COVID-19 UNIQUE POLICIES

General Practices

• Guests are required to wear face coverings, such as masks or face shields, and physically distance between groups and parties as much as possible while on the premises.

• Hand sanitizing stations are located throughout the lobbies for public use and should be used regularly.

• Guests with COVID-19 symptoms such as a temperature of 100.4°F or higher or other symptoms, either before or during a performance, are asked to leave and exchange their tickets for a later performance.

• All guests who attend productions at The Playhouse will have reservations with contact information retained in the ticket office to facilitate contact tracing if necessary.

• Programs are accessed digitally.

Exchanges & Refunds

The Playhouse ticket exchange policy allows guests to exchange tickets for a different performance if experiencing any symptoms of illness or if they learn they have been in contact with someone who has been diagnosed with COVID-19.

Seating

• Seats are assigned the day of the performance by staff based on reservation counts and group size. Seats are assigned to ensure physical distancing within the theatre space. Seat requests will be reviewed but not guaranteed. Requests for wheelchair seating will be honored.

• Seating will begin 1 hour prior to curtain to reduce congregating in the theatre.

Concessions

• Concessions are prepacked, individual servings, bottles, or cans.

· Concessions are available pre-show only.

Restrooms

• Only one individual or one family in a restroom at a time.

• Flushing handles, water, soap dispensers, and towel dispensers are touchless to reduce unnecessary contact.

• Identifiers on the floor will guide appropriate distancing for line management.

• After each guest use, surfaces including doors, door handles, grab bars, and sink counters will be wiped down.

Stairs & Elevators

• The use of stairwells and elevators will be managed to maintain appropriate physical distancing. Stairwells will be designated one direction only at a time.

• The elevator will be for one person/family/seating group at a time and buttons will be sanitized after each use.

Lobbies

• Lobbies will be managed to ensure appropriate distancing between guests.

• Seating and tables in the lobbies will be reduced to maintain safe distance between groups.

Intermission

There will be no intermission in order to reduce uncontrolled gatherings.

OTHER GENERAL PRACTICES

Accessibility

The Playhouse strives to make its facility and performances accessible to all guests. Our theatres are wheelchair accessible. Service animals are welcome. Assisted listening devices are available in the John Viars Theatre. If your hearing aid has a T-coil, toggle to that setting to receive the audio signal directly without any headset or other equipment needed. ASL interpreted performances and audio description are regularly scheduled for most productions. For these and other needs, please call the ticket office with specific service requests.

Cameras

The taking of photographs and the use of recording devices are not allowed during a performance and are a violation of state and federal copyright laws.

Cancellations

If a show is cancelled due to bad weather, an email will be sent to ticket holders. Cancellations will be noted on the phone system, website, and social media sites. Tickets for a cancelled performance may be exchanged for another performance. Please be sure the ticket office has your email information and current phone in the event a performance is cancelled. The Playhouse does not sell its contacts and does not sell or trade its email addresses.

Concessions

A variety of beverages and candy may be available for purchase. No outside drink or food are allowed in the theatre. Beverages and candy are allowed in the auditoriums. Staff reserve the right to deny alcoholic beverage service to anyone at their discretion.

HOUSE INFORMATION

Elevator

An elevator between levels is located at the east end of the building.

Emergency Exits

Please note the exit nearest your seat location. In the event of an emergency, ushers will provide direction.

Etiquette

Latecomers will be seated at an appropriate break in the play. Lobby chimes are sounded five minutes before curtain as well as the close of intermission. Disruptive, unruly guests, regardless of age, will be asked to leave. Cell phone ringers should be turned off.

Lost Items

Lost items will be held in the ticket office.

Parking

Free parking is available in The Playhouse lots and on streets surrounding the theatre. After 5:00 PM daily, free parking is available in the Shops at Roosevelt's east/back parking lot. Parking in the west/front Shops parking lot is restricted to Shops customers at all times. The Playhouse is not responsible for loss of any personal property left in vehicles.

Performance Content

The Playhouse does not rate subject matter as sensitivities vary from person to person. Questions about content, age appropriateness, or other aspects of the show such as strobe lights and other theatrical affects should be directed to the ticket office.

Performance Schedule

The regular John Viars Theatre performance schedule is 7:30 PM Wednesdays through Saturdays and 2:00 PM Sundays. The regular Kate Goldman Children's Theatre performance schedule is 7:00 PM Fridays, and 1:00 PM and 4:00 PM Saturdays and Sundays. The Family Holiday Classic performance schedule is 7:00 PM Fridays, and 1:00 PM and 5:00 PM Saturdays and Sundays. All times are subject to change.

Tickets

Each audience member must occupy a seat and have a ticket, including infants.

Ticket Office Hours

The ticket office is open Noon to 3:00 PM, Tuesday through Friday. Tickets are available 24 hours a day, seven days a week, online. Ticketing fees are the same whether purchased online, by phone, or at the ticket office.
