

About the Author Astrid Lindgren (1907-2002)

Astrid Ericsson Lindgren, daughter of a farmer, was born in Vimmerby, Sweden, on November 14, 1907,

the second of four children. She was encouraged to use her imagination and read books. Her favorite book, as a child, was *Anne of Green Gables*. In high school, Astrid, already gifted at creative writing, was told over and over that she would be an author someday. In 1931, she married Sture Lindgren and later became the mother of a son, Lars, and a daughter, Karin.

Although Astrid was still certain that she would never be an author, her two children begged her to tell them stories, and she did. In 1941, Astrid's daughter was sick with pneumonia and asked every evening to hear a story. One evening, when asked what the story should be about, little Karin replied, "Tell about Pippi Longstocking!" Without asking who Pippi Longstocking was, Astrid began to tell the story. Since she had an odd name, Pippi became an odd character. For several years, Astrid told and retold the story to Karin and her friends.

One snowy day in March 1944, Astrid went for a walk, fell, and broke her ankle. In bed for a week with nothing to do, she began to write. The very first book that she wrote was the highly acclaimed *Pippi Longstocking*. It was published in 1945.

Astrid wrote three books about *Pippi: Pippi Longstocking, Pippi on Board,* and *Pippi in the South Seas.* There were other children's books to follow; in all, there were over 90 published between 1944 and 1997.

AFTER THE SHOW: DISCUSSION QUESTIONS I never thought of it that way

When Pippi gets angry, she balls up her hand into a fist and threatens to punch someone or else she calls names like "dumb kids!" We all know that hitting and name-calling are not allowed. What should a kid do when they angry?

Pippi is not the only one who gets angry in the play. Mrs. Prysselius, Mrs. Settergren, the robbers, the teacher and the police all lose their tempers over Pippi's behavior. **What should adults do when they get angry?**

One of the good things Pippi does to calm herself down is to think about her Angel Mother watching over her. What nice thing could you think about that would help you calm down when you are angry?

Pippi breaks the rules all of the time and gets in trouble a lot. Getting in trouble is not funny when it happens to us. Why do you think that children so enjoy reading about her and seeing her on stage?

Pippi makes her own rules for going to bed and spending her own money. If you could make just one of your own rules, what would it be and why?

EXTRA! EXTRA! WRITE ALL ABOUT IT!

The following are a series of writing prompts that can be used all together or individually for a short creative writing experience.

1. Pippi's day at school is quite out-of-the-ordinary. If Pippi visited your classroom, would she be your friend? What is it about Pippi that would make her a good friend? If you don't think she'd be your friend, what about Pippi would keep her from being a good friend? What school activities would Pippi enjoy? What would she dislike doing? What classroom rules would Pippi break if she behaved in your schoolroom the way she did in Tommy and Annika's school? How do you think your teacher would respond if Pippi came into your classroom?

2. If you have read the book, *Pippi Longstocking*, describe some of the differences between the book and the play.

3. Pippi has some things that many children do not. She has a suitcase full of gold. She has incredible strength. She has her own house. She has two interesting pets: a horse and a monkey. If you could have one of those things, which would you choose and why? Which of Pippi's things would you not want and why?

4. If you could play one child's role in the play, *Pippi Longstocking*, which would it be? Tell why it would be enjoyable to play that role? What may be difficult about it?
