The pigeon in Don't Let the Pigeon Drive the Bus! is just pure

child. I know, certainly from my childhood, that all I was being told was, "No. No, no, no." So, it's so great to be able to yell "No!" I think it's very punk rock. I go to a library, and I've got 500 kids yelling at the top of their lungs, "No!" to me in a library. That just rocks. It's a very super-cool thing.

The trick is to be able to deny this character what it wants more than anything else and, at the same time, have sympathy for that character. I think it says a great thing for the empathy of children and adults who laugh at this — that they can deny this bird and still like him. I was determined to do books. I worked on what I thought were the great American children's books, and they stank. But I was making these little doodles, and this character started bugging me the pigeon, it turned out to be. He demanded more and more of my day. I'd just spend the day doodling this pigeon. Finally, I put him in a sketchbook. Every year I'd put out a very small sketchbook that I would send to family, friends, and clients. That was pretty much it.

I got an agent maybe three or four years later. She said, "Yeah, you know, you're right. Your books do stink." Then I gave her the pigeon sketchbook. And she said, "But I think there's a book in that. I think that that's a book."

So, I was very lucky. I didn't see it, necessarily, as a children's book. I just saw it as a funny pigeon.

### **A Smidgen of Pigeon**

Believe it or not, pigeons are very intelligent birds. Although sometimes considered a pest, pigeons have quite a noble history!

- Pigeons are one of the only animals to be "self-aware." That means they can recognize themselves in a mirror!
- Pigeons are one of the first known domesticated birds. They appear in works of art dating back to somewhere between 3000-4500 BC.
- Because of their superior navigational abilities, pigeons have been used to carry longdistance messages. They have been known to use the sun as a guide and have an internal magnetic compass. They saved thousands of lives during both World War I and World War II.
- Genghis Khan himself had a network of pigeons that he used to communicate with both allies and enemies.
- Pigeons have been taught to read the difference between random letters and actual words.
- Although often called dirty, pigeons are actually very clean animals.
- The fastest recorded flying speed of a pigeon is 92.5 miles per hour!
- Pigeons are very social animals and often can be seen in flocks of more than 20 birds.
