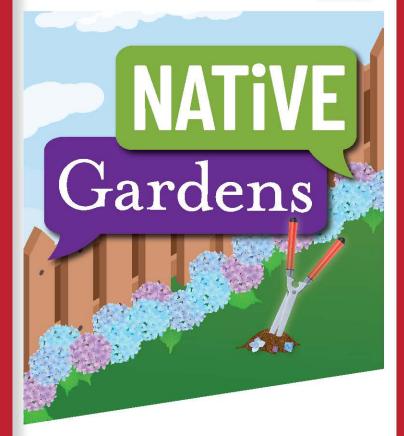

NATIVE GARDENS

Katy Merriman, Playhouse Artistic Director

I first read *Native Gardens* during the pandemic when I'd just started as artistic director at The Playhouse. I was reading piles of new titles, searching for the elusive "perfect play" for us to produce in a future season after the coronavirus had been banished or at least contained. I won't claim that I found the "perfect" play, but I do remember putting it down and thinking we have to do this at The Playhouse. Not only is it written by one of the most talented playwrights in the country, but it also hits on themes so relevant to all of us today that it would sting to watch if it weren't so brilliantly funny.

Native Gardens was first produced at the Cincinnati

Playhouse in January 2016. The playwright, Karen Zacarías, is one of the most produced playwrights in the nation. Her plays have been performed at the John F. Kennedy Center for Performing Arts, The Goodman Theater, The Denver Center, Alliance Theatre, La Jolla Playhouse, Horizon's Theatre, Teatro Vista, and *many* more. She was the first playwright-in-residence at Arena Stage and a core founder of the LATINX THEATRE COMMONS.

Zacarías is also the founder of the Young Playwrights' Theater (YPT), which teaches playwriting in local public schools in Washington, DC. YPT was recognized by the White House in 2010 as one of the most innovative arts programs in the nation and is currently used as curriculum in public schools in six states. The idea for the *Native Gardens* came from a casual conversation that began among Zacarías and her friends about conflicts with their neighbors and how uncomfortable and stressful those squabbles can be. "All of those fights are so primal and poetic and absurd in some ways," Zacarías said. "But the consequences were really real and emotionally upsetting. And I kept thinking, 'Wow, it's almost like every single battle between nations or tribes, etc., boils down to this fight about property and culture, in a sense."

Native Gardens was well-received throughout the nation in the years following its premiere. While the play addresses real and prevalent issues, it deals with them with a refreshing sense of humor. A review from DC Theatre Scene said, "Native Gardens is a true breath of comic fresh air. It's a biting, perceptive, and ultimately hopeful sendup to our fraught relationships with those around us – even right next door. Beyond snappy one-liners and garden hose fights, the play challenges audiences to look beyond petty differences and rediscover our shared decency."

You are in for a fantastic experience, and I am thankful that we have been lucky enough to produce it. I heartily thank Lorenzo Sandoval, the co-director of this play, and the cast of our show. We taught each other and learned so much during this experience, and I can't wait for you to now get to experience some of that with us now. Enjoy!

Native Gardens se produjo por primera vez en el

Cincinnati Playhouse en enero de 2016. La dramaturga, Karen Zacarías, es una de las dramaturgas más producidas en la nación cuyas obras se han representado en el Centro John F. Kennedy para las Artes Escénicas, el Teatro Goodman, el Denver Center, Alliance Theatre, La Jolla Playhouse, Horizon's Theatre, Teatro Vista y muchos más. Fue la primera dramaturga residente en Arena Stage y una de las principales fundadoras de LATINX THEATER COMMONS.

Zacarías también es el fundador del Young Playwright's Theatre, que enseña dramaturgia en escuelas públicas locales en Washington, DC. YPT fue reconocido por la Casa Blanca en 2010 como uno de los programas de arte más innovadores del país y actualmente se utiliza como plan de estudios en las escuelas públicas de seis estados. La idea de *Native Gardens* surgió de una conversación informal que comenzó entre Zacarías y sus amigos sobre los conflictos con sus vecinos y lo incómodas y estresantes que pueden ser esas disputas. "Todas esas peleas son tan primitivas, poéticas y absurdas en algunos aspectos," dijo Zacarías. "Pero las consecuencias fueron realmente reales y emocionalmente perturbadoras. Y seguí pensando, "Wow, es casi como si cada batalla entre naciones o tribus, etc., se redujera a esta lucha por la propiedad y la cultura, en cierto sentido.""

Native Gardens fue bien recibido en todo el país en los años posteriores a su estreno. Si bien la obra aborda problemas reales y predominantes, los trata con un refrescante sentido del humor. Una reseña de DC Theatre Scene dijo: "Native Gardens es un verdadero soplo de aire fresco cómico. Es un mensaje mordaz, perceptivo y, en última instancia, esperanzador sobre nuestras tensas relaciones con quienes nos rodean, incluso justo al lado. Más allá de las ingeniosas frases ingeniosas y las peleas de mangueras de jardín, la obra desafía al público a mirar más allá de las pequeñas diferencias y redescubrir nuestra decencia compartida."

Cancellations

If a show is cancelled due to bad weather, an email will be sent to ticket holders. Cancellations will be noted on the phone system, website, and social media sites. Tickets for a cancelled performance may be exchanged for another performance. Please be sure the ticket office has your email information and current phone in the event a performance is cancelled. The Playhouse does not sell its contacts and does not sell or trade its email addresses

Concessions

A variety of beverages and candy may be available for purchase and are allowed in auditoriums. No outside drink or food are allowed. Staff reserve the right to denv alcoholic beverage service to anyone at their discretion.

Etiquette

Latecomers will be seated at an appropriate break in the play. Lobby chimes are sounded five minutes before curtain as well as the close of intermission. Disruptive, unruly guests, regardless of age, will be asked to leave. Cell phone ringers should be turned off.

Performance Content

The Playhouse does not rate subject matter as sensitivities vary from person to person. Questions about content, age appropriateness, or other aspects of the show such as strobe lights and other theatrical affects should be directed to the ticket office.

Performance Schedule

The regular John Viars Theatre performance schedule is 7:30 PM Wednesdays through Saturdays, and 2:00 PM Sundays. The regular Kate Goldman Children's Theatre performance schedule is 7:00 PM Fridays, and 1:00 PM and 4:00 PM Saturdays and Sundays. The Family Holiday Classic performance schedule is 7:00 PM Fridays, and 1:00 PM and 5:00 PM Saturdays and Sundays. All times are subject to change.

Preshow Talk

A preshow talk for each John Viars Theatre performance will begin 30 minutes prior to curtain in the west lobby.

Safety Protocols

Karen Zacarías (Playwright) was recently hailed by American Theater magazine as one of the 10 most-produced playwrights in the US. Her award-winning plays include The Copper Children, Destiny of Desire, Native Gardens, The Book

Club Play, Legacy of Light, Mariela in the Desert, The Sins of Sor Juana, and the adaptations of Just Like Us, Into the Beautiful North, and How the Garcia Girls Lost Their Accent. She is the author of 10 renowned TYA musicals including Ella Enchanted: The Musical and the librettist of several ballets. She is one of the inaugural resident playwrights at Arena Stage, a core founder of the Latinx Theatre Commons – a large national organization of artists seeking to update the American narrative with the stories of Latinos – and she is the founder of the award-winning Young Playwrights' Theater (YPT). YPT was cited by

the Obama administration as one of the best arts-education programs on the nation. Karen was voted 2018 Washingtonian of the Year by Washingtonian Magazine for her advocacy work involving the arts. She is an inaugural 2019 Sine Fellow for Policy Innovation at American University and is selected by The League of Professional Theatre Women to receive the 2019 Lee Reynolds Award, given annually to a woman in theater who has helped illuminate the possibilities for social, cultural, or political change. 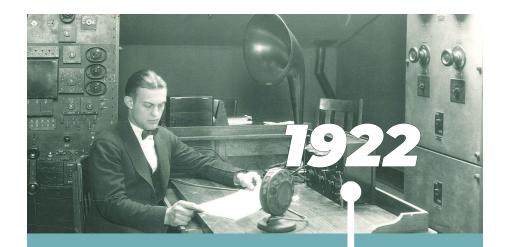
