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
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


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GUEST INFORMATION

ASL interpreted performances and audio description performances are available upon request. For these and other needs, please call the ticket office with specific service requests.

Cancellations

If a show is cancelled due to bad weather, an email will be sent to ticket holders. Cancellations will be noted on the phone system, website, and social media sites. Tickets for a cancelled performance may be exchanged for another performance. Please be sure the ticket office has your email information and current phone in the event a performance is cancelled. The Playhouse does not sell its contacts and does not sell or trade its email addresses

The Playhouse does not rate subject matter as sensitivities vary from person to person. Questions about content, age appropriateness, or other aspects of the show such as strobe lights and other theatrical affects should be directed to the ticket office.

Performance Schedule

The regular Signature Series performance schedule is 7:30 PM Wednesdays through Saturdays, and 2:00 PM Sundays. The regular Kate Goldman Family Series performance schedule is 7:00 PM Fridays, and 1:00 PM and 4:00 PM Saturdays and Sundays. The December performance schedule is 7:00 PM Fridays, and 1:00 PM and 5:00 PM Saturdays and Sundays. All times are subject to change.

Preshow Talk

A preshow talk for each Signature Series performance will begin 30 minutes prior to curtain in the west lobby.

Safety Protocols

BEAUTIFUL: THE CAROLE KING MUSICAL

Beautiful: The Carole King Musical debuted on Broadway in January 2014 at the Stephen Sondheim Theatre. Having sold out its entire run in the pre-Broadway tryout at the Curran Theatre in San Francisco, CA, it was no surprise that it also took Broadway by storm. Starring Jessie Mueller as King and Jake Epstein as Gerry Goffin, it brought home two Tony Awards, one for Best Leading Actress for Mueller and the other for Best Sound Design. The cast album also won a Grammy in 2015 for Best Musical Theatre Album. After many successful United States and international tours, we are excited to get to finally present this title in regional and community theatres!

The Playhouse is one of the first community theatres to produce *Beautiful* in our region. As a matter of fact, the community theatre debut of *Beautiful* took place at the Green Room Community Theatre in North Carolina in September 2023. Not only is this the first time The Playhouse has produced *Beautiful*, but the creative team is also working together for the first time. Katrina Ploof's passionate and intentional direction, Napoleon Douglas's electric choreography and philosophic knowledge of the stage, and Tristan Miedema's command of both solo and ensemble music directing combine to form a top-notch team that has pushed this musical to its fullest potential. Be sure to read their bios in this playbill!

Beautiful depicts King's early career and the life and music events that culminated in her first performance at Carnegie Hall in 1971. While the play centers on the story of King's life in the music industry, it also features several performing groups and industry professionals who opened doors not just for King but for people who were underrepresented in the business at the time.





Don Kirshner, a Jewish New Yorker himself, ran his business in the Brill Building at 1650 Broadway. The Brill Building contained over 100 music businesses in the '60s and was known as having its own "Brill Building Sound," most heavily influenced by Latin music, traditional Black Gospel, and rhythm and blues. In an era of American history led by mostly white, male executives after the end of WWII and during the decades of the Civil Rights Movement, this building was buzzing with music to respond to the times. King's success paved the way for future female musicians to thrive in the music industry, and the music she wrote with Goffin helped launched the careers of so many beloved performers. Their 1960s Billboard hit "Will You Still Love Me Tomorrow," for example, was the first No. 1 hit by a Black, female group, The Shirelles.

King has garnered countless awards and recognition for her contributions to music. Her songs have been sung by too many famous names to list. (I recommend you Google Aretha Franklin singing "(You Make Me Feel Like) A Natural Woman" at the Kennedy Center Awards if you haven't seen *that* yet.) If you think you don't know Carole King's music, think again.

We hope that *Beautiful: The Carole King Musical* shows you what extraordinary contributions King has made to the music world and perhaps reignites a love and celebration of the music of the '50s and '60s. Enjoy!

His book for Beautiful: The Carole King Musical was nominated for Tony, Drama Desk, and Outer Critics Circle awards. He began his career as a writer for Saturday Night Live in what was incontestably the worst year in the show's history. He has written essays on the arts and politics for the New Republic, The New Yorker, The Nation, The New York Times, and Vanity Fair. He passed away on Nov. 4, 2022.



Gerry Goffin (Words & Music), born in Brooklyn in 1939, met Carole King at Queens College and their musical collaboration began almost immediately. They married in 1959 and that same year wrote their first hit

song "Will You Love Me Tomorrow" which was recorded by The Shirelles. The duo penned more than 50 Top-40 hits including "The Locomotion," "(You Make Me Fell Like) A Natural Woman," and "Up on the Roof." In 1987, Goffin and King were inducted into the Songwriters Hall of Fame and inducted into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame in 1990. Goffin has left an indelible mark on American music.



Carole King (Words & Music)
has left her mark on pop music.
At age 17 she wrote her first
#1 hit with Gerry Goffin, "Will
You Love Me Tomorrow," for
The Shirelles. The dozens of
chart hits Goffin and King wrote

during this period became legendary, but it was 1971's *Tapestry* that took King to the pinnacle, speaking personally to her contemporaries and providing a spiritual musical backdrop to the decade. More than 400 of her compositions have been recorded by over 1,000 artists resulting in 100 hit singles and six Grammys.

Barry Mann (Words & Music) has written the melodies of some of the most influential pop songs in musical history. In addition to "You've Lost That Lovin' Feeling," the most-played song of the last century, and the songs heard in Beautiful, he composed later standards like "Somewhere Out There" (winner of two Grammys), "Here You Come Again," "Sometimes When We Touch," "Just Once," and "Don't Know Much." Together he and Cynthia Weil have amassed an incredible 112 pop, country, and R&B awards from Broadcast Music Inc for significant radio air play. He has been inducted into both the Songwriters Hall of Fame and the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame.

Cynthia Weil (Words & Music) was the acclaimed lyricist of classic songs such as "You've Lost That Lovin' Feeling," the mostplayed song of the 20th century. In addition to the songs heard in Beautiful, she set the words to later standards including "Somewhere Out There," "Here You Come Again," "He's So Shy," "Just Once," and "Don't Know Much," to name just a few. Weil was inducted into the Songwriters Hall of Fame and the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame, and honored with multiple Grammy nominations and two Grammy awards for "Somewhere Out There" as the Motion Picture Song of the Year and Song of the Year. She passed away on June 1, 2023.

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

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
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
