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
# **Getting to Know You:**

# AFTER THE SHOW: DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

- Have you ever heard the phrase "Don't judge a book by its cover"? When Bean sees Ivy for the first time, she doesn't think they can be friends because she looks "boring." Why wouldn't we want to judge someone on their appearance? Has that ever happened to you?
- Bean and her sister, Nancy, get on each other's nerves and argue a lot. Why
  do you think that is? Do you have any brothers or sisters? Do you get along
  or do you bicker?
- On the surface, Ivy and Bean have very opposite personalities. Why do you think they become such good friends? In what ways are they different? How are they the same?
- Do you have to be like someone to be good friends with them? How are you different from your friends?

#### **WORLD RECORDS**

Ivy and Bean and their friends are trying to set a world record, which made us curious about world records in theatre. Here is what we found out!

- The Great Auditorium in The National People's Congress Building in Beijing, China, is the world's largest theatre. It seats about 10,000. If The Playhouse seats 400 people, how many Playhouses could fit into the Great Auditorium? (10,000÷400=25)
- A 2,400-pound puppet of King Kong is the world's largest puppet. It was created for the Broadway musical of the same name. Part marionette, part rod-puppet, and part animatronic, it was also one of the most complex puppets ever made.
- Broadway musical Spiderman: Turn Off the Dark is the world's most expensive theatre production. It cost over \$75 million dollars to produce in 2011.
- The world's largest stage is the Hilton Theater in Reno, Nevada. It measures 175 by 241 feet. By comparison, The Playhouse stage is 30 by 33 feet.
- The outdoor Theatre of Dionysus is the world's oldest theatre. It was built around 500 BC, making it about 2,500 years old! To put it in perspective, The Playhouse has been around for a mere 105 years.

What world record do you want to accomplish? Go get it!

#### THE DIRT ON DIRT

Bean and her friends love to play in the dirt and dig for worms, and that made us curious. What IS dirt anyway? Why are earthworms important? Here is what we found out!

• Dirt is made of sand, clay, and silt. Because it does not contain living things, it is considered "dead" and will not grow new life. Plants cannot grow in dirt.

• Soil has dirt in it, but also contains living things, like microbes, worms, fungi,

and other organic matter. That is what allows it to nurture plant life in a field or garden.

• You can help transform your dirt into soil by adding organic compost and earthworms. Think earthworms are just for fishing? Think again! They eat harmful bacteria and the tunnels they make help loosen and aerate soil. Worm poop adds important nutrients and microbes as well. Gross, but so cool!

• Earthworms can eat their own weight in a day



#### **EDIBLE DIRT RECIPE**

It is said that we all eat at least a little bit of dirt each day: the average person eats about six pounds of dirt over a lifetime. Eww! If you'd rather try something a little tastier, try preparing and eating this delicious edible dirt instead.

#### **INGREDIENTS**

- Instant chocolate pudding mix
- 10-12 Oreo cookies
- Gummy worms
- 1. Prepare pudding mix per package instructions.
- 2. Place Oreo cookies into a sealed Ziploc baggie and crush into smaller pieces. A rolling pin works well for this!
- Layer pudding and cookie crumbs in a cup. You can use a clean small flowerpot as well for added realism.
- 4. "Bury" some worms in the mixture to be discovered later with your spoon!

#### **SOIL SEPARATION**

YOU WILL NEED: A clear jar with lid (glass or plastic), soil, water, and liquid dish soap.

#### **DIRECTIONS:**

- 1. Fill your jar about halfway with soil.
- 2. Add clean water until the jar is about 3/4 full.
- 3. Add one teaspoon of liquid dish soap and tightly screw the lid on the jar.
- 4. Shake the jar hard for 3 minutes, then wait for the soil layers to separate. This could take a few minutes or a few days.

The liquid dish soap surrounds each soil piece in the jar, so they stay separate and settle at the bottom without bringing along other bits that aren't the same as them.

**Stuff floating in or on top of the water layer:** Organic matter, like dead leaves, bugs, and sticks.

**Clay:** The smallest particles that fit the tightest together, causing water and nutrients to flow through.

**Silt:** Particles smaller than clay, but larger than sand.

Sand: The heaviest particles which allow larger spaces between particles that water and nutrients can flow out of.

#### THINK LIKE A SCIENTIST:

- Which layer is the largest and makes up the most of your soil?
- Is there anything above the dirt floating in the water layer?
- How healthy do you think your soil/dirt is? (Hint: Were there any plants growing around where you dug it up?)
