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

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



# Accessibility

The Playhouse strives to make its facility and performances accessible to all guests. Our theatres are wheelchair accessible. Service animals are welcome. Assisted listening devices are available in the John Viars Theatre. If your hearing aid has a T-coil, toggle to that setting to receive the audio signal directly without any headset or other equipment needed. ASL interpreted performances and audio description performances are available upon request. For these and other needs, please call the ticket office with specific service requests.

### Cameras

The taking of photographs and the use of recording devices are not allowed during a performance and are a violation of state and federal copyright laws.

# Cancellations

If a show is cancelled due to bad weather, an email will be sent to ticket holders. Cancellations will be noted on the phone system, website, and social media sites. Tickets for a cancelled performance may be exchanged for another performance. Please be sure the ticket office has your email information and current phone in the event a performance is cancelled. The Playhouse does not sell its contacts and does not sell or trade its email addresses.

### Companion Restroom

A companion restroom is located on the lower level across from the coatrack.

## Concessions

A variety of beverages and candy may be available for purchase and are allowed in auditoriums. No outside drink or food are allowed. Staff reserve the right to deny alcoholic beverage service to anyone at their discretion.

### Elevator

An elevator between levels is located at the east end of the building.

## **Emergency Exits**

Please note the exit nearest your seat location. In the event of an emergency, ushers will provide direction.

### Ftiguett

Latecomers will be seated at an appropriate break in the play. Lobby chimes are sounded five minutes before curtain as well as the close of intermission. Disruptive, unruly guests, regardless of age, will be asked to leave. Cell phone ringers should be turned off.

### Parking

Free parking is available in The Playhouse lots and on streets surrounding the theatre. After 5:00 PM daily, free parking is available in the Shops at Roosevelt's east/back parking lot. Parking in the west/front Shops parking lot is

restricted to Shops customers at all times. The Playhouse is not responsible for loss of any personal property left in vehicles

### Performance Content

The Playhouse does not rate subject matter as sensitivities vary from person to person. Questions about content, age appropriateness, or other aspects of the show such as strobe lights and other theatrical affects should be directed to the ticket office.

# Performance Schedule

The regular Signature Series performance schedule is 7:30 PM Wednesdays through Saturdays and 2:00 PM Sundays. The regular Kate Goldman Family Series performance schedule is 7:00 PM Fridays, and 1:00 PM and 4:00 PM Saturdays and Sundays. The December performance schedule is 7:00 PM Thursdays and Fridays, and 1:00 PM and 5:00 PM Saturdays and Sundays. All times are subject to change.

### **Preshow Talk**

A preshow talk for each Signature Series performance, excluding the December show, will begin 30 minutes prior to curtain in the west lobby. The December show will have preshow music in the west lobby.

# Safety Protocols



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
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
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# DISNEY'S BEAUTY AND THE BEAST

Nicholas Amundson, Director

Bonjour! Be our guest as we journey through the Beast's magic mirror to a faraway land!

The original Disney animated *Beauty* and the *Beast* hit the big screen in 1991, quickly becoming a family favorite. It was adapted for the stage in 1993, finding its way to Broadway in 1994 with music by Alan Menken, lyrics by Howard Ashman and Tim Rice, and a book by Linda Woolverton. The Broadway musical ran for 13 years with 5,461 performances, making it the sixth longest-running show by the time it closed in 2007

Through the years, Beauty and the Beast has been retold countless times and is a favorite for community theaters and schools worldwide. Many productions focus on the stained-glass aesthetic from the movie or emphasize the enchanted rose. The Playhouse production team wanted to highlight a different, favorite magical element. When an old beggar woman arrives at the castle, seeking shelter from the cold, she offers the prince a rose in exchange for kindness. But when she sees he has no love or compassion in his heart, she transforms him into a

terrifying Beast and gives him a magic mirror to view the world beyond his castle. In The Playhouse production, the mirror is a central design element, as if we are watching the story unfold through it. The set is framed with a gold mirror-like design that mimics the hand prop version you'll see on stage.

When the enchantress casts her spell, the rose she offers becomes the heartbeat of the curse. The Beast must find true love before the last petal falls or he will remain a Beast forever. The spell also affects everyone in the castle. In the animated movie, the staff are transformed into inanimate objects that can move and talk. In the stage adaptation, each time the rose loses a petal, the castle staff becomes a little less human, slowly morphing into objects. This adjustment allows costume designers to add object-inspired elements to human actors, symbolizing their gradual transformation.

Theatre can change and shape lives and relationships. Like Belle and the Beast, we hope all who experience this production feel something shift within them, a reminder of the magic that happens when we look beyond appearances and find connection.

Howard Ashman (*Lyrics*) is best known as a pivotal creative mind behind the renaissance of Disney animation and his work on *The Little Mermaid, Aladdin,* and *Beauty and the Beast* (which is dedicated to, "Our friend, Howard

Ashman, who gave a Mermaid her voice and a Beast his soul...") Howard's first love was theater. He was a founder of off off Broadway's renowned WPA Theater where he conceived, wrote, and directed *God Bless You, Mr. Rosewater*, as well as the classic musical, *Little Shop of Horrors* (both with music by Alan Menken). In 1986, he wrote and directed the Broadway musical *Smile* (music by Marvin Hamlisch). Lamented as a lost treasure of the 1980s theater scene, *Smile* remains popular on high school and college campuses throughout the country. Howard died in 1991 from complications of AIDS. **Tim Rice** (*Lyrics*) has worked in music, theatre, and film since 1965, when he met Andrew Lloyd Webber, a fellow struggling songwriter. Rather than pursue Tim's ambitions to write rock or pop songs, they turned their

attention to Andrew's obsession; musical theater. Their first collaboration, The Likes Of Us (lyrics by Tim, music by Andrew), was an unsuccessful show based on the life of Dr. Barnardo, the Victorian philanthropist. Their next three works together were much more successful: Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat, Jesus Christ Superstar, and Evita. Tim has also worked with other distinguished popular composers such as Elton John (The Lion King, Aida), Alan Menken (Aladdin, King David, Beauty and the Beast), and Bjorn Ulvaeus and Benny Andersson (Chess). From Here to Eternity, with music by newcomer Stuart Brayson, coproduced with Lee Menzies, directed by Tamara Harvey, and with book by Bill Oakes, premiered in the West End at the Shaftesbury Theatre in 2013. He formed his own cricket team in 1973 and was president of the MCC in 2002. In 2013, he wrote and presented a 52-part series for BBC Radio 2, American Pie, a trawl through the music and musicians of every American State. He has won several awards, mainly for the wrong thing or for simply turning up.



**Linda Woolverton** (Book) has writing credits that include the screenplay for the animated feature film Beauty and the Beast (Golden Globe winner and Academy Award Best Picture nominee); the screenplay (shared)

for Homeward Bound: The Incredible Journey; screenplay (shared) for the animated feature film *The Lion King*; the book for the Broadway musical Disney's Beauty and the Beast (Tony Award nomination for Best Book of a Musical, winner 1998 Olivier Award Best New Musical); and book (shared) for Elton John and Tim Rice's Broadway musical Aida. She has written two young-adult novels, Star-Wind and Running Before The Wind. She holds a bachelor's degree in theatre arts from California State University Long Beach and a master's degree in theatre from California State University Fullerton. Linda is currently involved in writing and producing film projects for Miramax and Revolution studios. She lives in Los Angeles with her husband, Lee Flicker, and daughter Keaton.
